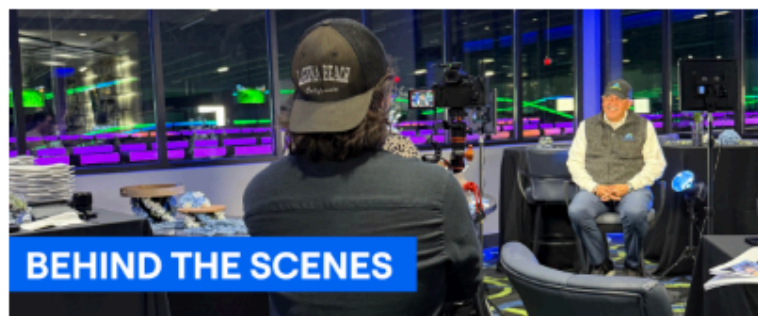
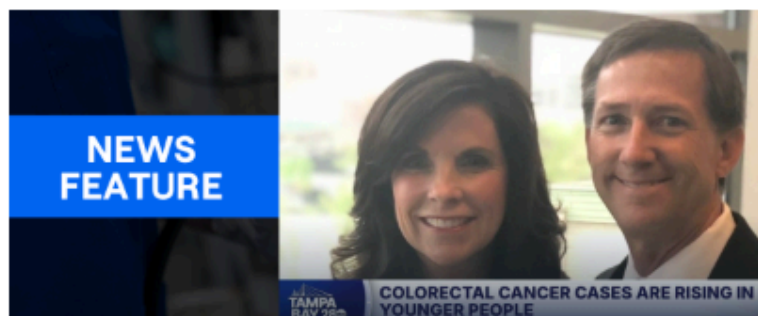




We've been working on some exciting new content that we can't wait to share with you soon—all in support of our mission to raise awareness about colorectal cancer and the importance of early detection.
